

FROM HOWIE SEAGO, CO-DIRECTOR

What a dream! When I first embarked on my professional performing career over forty years ago, I had no vision whatsoever of acting in a Shakespearean production. Nine Shakespearean productions later and here I am, amazed to be co-directing *A Midsummer Night's Dream*. I am so appreciative of the humane and encompassing vision Teresa put forth in producing this highly artistic ASL (American Sign Language) production. I, and the Deaf members of the cast are truly grateful for this rare, unique production which includes vignettes of our Deaf culture. It is a huge challenge to translate Shakespearean into ASL, striving to match the sophistication and poetry of Shakespeare. We created many "new but ancient" signs to properly represent the antiquity of the text. For example, there weren't wristwatches back then so we use the position of the "sun" or "moon" signs to indicate time. Or the number of bells tolling. We also



tried to match Shakespeare's humor by tweaking our signs to present unique phrasing. For example,

"Of thy misprision must perforce ensue. / Some true love turn'd and not a false turn'd true."

We used the sign for "falling in love" in normal fashion, then reverse back to the starting point and point the "fall in love" sign in a different direction to a different person, like in a "V" pattern.

It is a gratifying experience to work with Teresa, a gifted, understanding, patient mentor, and a talented cast. I am especially proud to introduce Shakespeare to both seasoned and novice Deaf actors and the Deaf community. I am also pleased to share Deaf culture and the beauty of ASL with our hearing actors and Seattle audiences. One last note: Lori, thanks with love and gratitude. Enjoy our show!

Deaf Spotlight inspires, encourages, and showcases creative works of, by, and for Deaf people in the Pacific Northwest through events that celebrate Deaf culture and American Sign Language. She graduated from Rochester Institute of Technology's Diagnostic Medical Sonography program in 1998 followed by a Masters of Science in Secondary Education from National Technical Institute for the Deaf in 2002. Community involvements include Board Chair of Abused Deaf Women Advocacy Services (ADWAS), a nonprofit organization that empowers survivors of domestic violence and sexual assault. She was introduced to acting as a young child by participating in summer drama camps (which is how she met Howie Seago!) Most recent theater role was Mrs. Mabel Bell in SOUND, produced by Azeotrope, which was nominated for Outstanding New Play at the 2016 Gregory Awards. She is married to Ken Gibson and their two daughters, Mackenzie and Mckenna, have continued in their mother's footsteps by participating in Deaf Spotlight's Drama Camps in the last two summers.

Michael D. Blum (Oberon) Michael has been an actor and director since childhood. Over the years he has co-founded two Latino theater companies; La Compañía De Teatro De Alburguerque, Inc. in the 1980's, and more recently Teatro Nuevo México, where he served as Co-Artistic Director for four years. 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
